Students have multiple supports in order to achieve. The school itself offers a specific time for students to meet with their teachers and go over the material again. Students can volunteer to sign up for this opportunity and/or students can be called in by their teachers. This program has been of great success to many of the students who have taken advantage of the extra learning time.

One of my own children is currently involved in a 4-H program which offers afterschool tutoring and mentoring once a week at his elementary school. When I was high school, I participated in the TRIO program Upward Bound. It is linked to a local college and created to assist low-income, free-generation students to attend and succeed in their collegiate futures. Both of these programs offer additional assistance beyond what the teacher can offer themselves.

 - a. Weakness: Discipline of individual student's problems.

I have been procrastinating putting a specific discipline plan down on paper because I have been unsure as to the best way to approach the situation. Also, up to this point, I have had a mentor teacher in the classroom to 'back me up' if there was an issue. Being left alone in the classroom has made it glaringly obvious that I have been underprepared. Most of my students don't require any more intervention than a quick call back to attention. There are a few, however, that require a more active approach. It is imperative to implement a plan as soon as possible in order to promote a productive learning environment.

4. How will you measure/assess if you reached your goal?

I will be able to assess if I have reached my goal by being able to deal quickly and effectively with behavioral issues in the classroom. I can measure its effectiveness and success by documenting behavioral issues and whether they reoccur with the same frequency as prior to implementation.

5. What is the timeline for your goal?

I plan to begin implementing my behavioral management plan tomorrow. I should see data on whether it is successful or not by the end of next week. Further tweaks can be implemented as needed.

Throughout the week, members of the math department take the time to communicate with each other about the successes and struggles of their students. They also schedule time on Monday afternoons to meet as a department to further discuss particular student issues as well as to create common assessments (homework, classwork, quizzes, and tests.) They share the responsibilities of creating these assessments. Some are more adept at using the computer and can organize the content that others create on the spot into usable worksheets, presentations, and activities. Each member of the community brings a different perspective and additional data to the table which in turn helps both themselves and others to create a more productive curriculum.

Besides attending and actively participating in school and district PLC meetings, I have begun to participate in the math twitter and blog community.
